## What can I do at home to support my child?

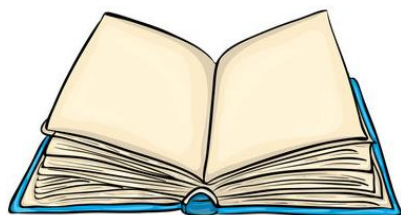
It is important for both school and parents to actively teach children to read. We need you to create a home environment where reading is encouraged and seen as a pleasurable experience.

Ensure your child reads and hears you read to them at least five times a week. This is just as important for older children as it is for younger children.

Spending just 10 minutes reading with your child every day will be invaluable in developing their ability to become a fluent and avid reader.

## What can I ask my child about their book?

It is crucial that you ask your child questions before, during and after reading time. Comprehension questions encourage children to read for understanding and meaning.

Questioning your child will help them to remember what they have read and make sense of it, rather than simple decoding words.

You can find question prompts in your child's reading record. If you have any questions about supporting your child with their reading, **please speak to your child's class teacher.**

## What can I do if my child is a reluctant reader?

We believe little and often is the best approach to reading. Find a quiet and comfortable space and give your child your full attention.

Take it in turns to read each page and don't be afraid of silly voices!

Allow your child to revisit a favourite book – there is nothing wrong with reading a book many times and it creates a sense of security.

Finally, be a good role model. Allow your child to see you enjoying reading and praise, praise, praise!

## What can I read with my child?
